In January 2000, a Japanese government commission published a report that outlined the main goals for Japan in the twenty-first century. In the face of economic recession, rising crime rates and high unemployment, the commission was set up by the prime minister and given the task of 24 a new course for the country in the coming decades. The commission's main findings surprised many people: Japanese citizens need to loosen their hold on some of their core values if the country is to address its current social ills successfully. The commission concluded that Japanese culture places too much value on conformity and equality, and called for action to reduce the "excessive degree of

<u>25</u> and uniformity" in society. It pointed to some basic facets of Japanese life which <u>26</u> this conformity: almost all schoolchildren in Japan wear identical dark-blue uniforms that mask signs of individuality, while employees generally stay late at the office <u>27</u> they do not need to because of an unspoken rule about leaving early.
